Another interesting addition to the website is an interview with Margaret Swain. She has been on Basswood since 1923 and provides an interesting perspective on our lake's history. Once again, I will attempt to call all residents of the lake during the winter months. Our board represents you and we want to know your issues or concerns. Last year over 90% of those contacted listed maintaining water quality as their number one priority. During the past year our membership increased approximately 60%, but it still represents less than half of the lake's residents. We need a majority to belong to better express your views to Huron Shores, Algoma Health, the MNR, and other agencies that monitor our lake. We also want to continually update our records. ## The Big Basswood Wildlife and Habitat Inventory

"Seeing what's there"

We all notice many special things on and around Big Basswood Lake. For years we have looked for bears, noticed the birds, checked out when the Lady's Slippers were blooming and kept track of the fish. We share our stories and observations with our friends and family. I would like to see the lake community share these observation and stories. By doing this, we all can learn more about the lake and its diverse natural habitat.

The Big Basswood Lake Association (BBLA) has put into place the Big Basswood Wildlife and Habitat Inventory. It is designed to be an online community forum. Go to www.bigbasswood.ca and click on the link to the inventory. Register and participate!! See what's there, share your observations with the community, ask questions, provide answers and let everyone see your pictures.

Things we have observed this year include: eagles, a bear with three cubs, not so many loons, a snapping turtle and deer in the summer (unusual for us at Basswood, a daily occurrence at home in Michigan).

There are tools and resources available (see below). Forestland even has a nature journal available. A notebook and a pencil would work too! We are fortunate to be a part of Big Basswood Lake, a pristine lake with an abundance of habitat and wildlife surrounding it. By observing, recording, learning and "seeing what's there" we also will be able to better understand what we need to do to continue to preserve this
