Welcome back to Big Basswood Lake for the summer of 2017.

A cool and wet spring and some late spring storms have certainly contributed to an interesting start to the summer on Basswood. It looks like the weather has now turned and we are on our way to a beautiful summer. The good news is that we won't have to worry about early season lake levels this year.

The June 11th thunderstorm and "wind burst" has unfortunately resulted in some tree and cottage damage around the lake. I'm hoping that our members either avoided damage or are well on their way to recovery.

The board of directors has been busy in the off season on a number of fronts. As I hope you will see from this newsletter, we have been active in a number of areas that we think are important to the stewardship of our beautiful lake and the continued enjoyment of it by all of our members.

Some highlights of our activities include:

- 1. Marilyn and Bob Kellum attending the FOCA annual meeting in Toronto on behalf of the association this spring
- 2. Scoping out of a septic inspection program which was previously mandated by our membership.
- 3. Following up with the provincial and municipal governments on the native land claim that has been filed to understand how it may impact our members.
- 4. Initiation of a new photo contest and photo calendar which was so well received by our members last year.
- 5. Initiation of a Loon survey

We continue to give top priority to issue of water quality on our lake. As we talked about at last year's annual meeting, Big Basswood enjoys some of the best water quality in all of Ontario as measured by the FOCA lake partner program and documented on their web site. The Kellums continue to monitor water quality by taking monthly Secchi Disk readings at various points on the lake.

In addition, we have reinitiated phosphorous level testing this year. Elevated phosphorous levels are an important pre-indicator to septic problems and potential algae blooms which we have been fortunate to avoid. Also, please see the article in this newsletter reporting on our progress towards initiating a septic inspection program to protect the valuable resource that we have in Big Basswood Lake.

As noted in our schedule of events, the AGM will be held in at the Sowerby Hall at 10 A.M. on Sunday, July 30th. Please note that this is a week later than originally announced as the Hall was booked for a wedding on the weekend of July 23rd. We plan to restrict the AGM meeting topics to the important, formal issues that are important to discuss with our membership. As with last year, we plan to follow up with an informal, social evening later in August featuring a speaker on an interesting local issue. Stay tuned for an announcement of the speaker and the date.

We announced in last fall's newsletter that our membership exceeded 100 members for the first time in many years. In fact, membership peaked at 105 members by the end of the year thanks to the hard work of Mike Hunting and the other board members. 



This spring BBLA was represented at the Federation of Ontario Cottagers' Association's (FOCA) AGM in Toronto by Marilyn and Bob Kellum. This meeting included a business meeting, board member elections, informative speakers, educational materials and a chance to network. Sound familiar? BBLA's AGM, coming up Sunday, July 30th, provides these opportunities for our members.

The first speaker, Bob Lake, provided background information about Ontario's electric power service and billing rates. FOCA representatives Terry Rees and Ian White followed with FOCA's efforts to assure reasonable and fair rates to rural users.

Dr. Stephanie Melles, from Ryerson University, presented "Understanding Inland Lakes- are they stressed out?". Lake stressors include climate change, water levels, acidification, eutrophication, shoreline development, and exploitation. Data being reviewed and monitored include Lake Partner phosphorus levels and hot spots beginning in 2003-2006. Research on lakes worldwide suggests that lake surface water temperature rise outpaces that of atmosphere and ocean.

Over the winter, the lake association was contacted Mr. Dave Davis of Maryland via our Facebook page. Mr. Davis was looking for a "Lake Waguekobing" which was an "easy portage from the Mississagi River". His relatives had been members of the Canadian Camp Club that had been established on the lake in the early 1900s. We have been in touch with him and believe that Big Basswood which has also been known as Lake Wakeobi is, in fact, the same lake and that the Kellums cottage which is on Clubhouse Rd, is on the site of the original club house. We will continue to communicate with Mr. Davis in an attempt to learn more about this interesting chapter in our lake's history.

Below is an article from the NY Times announcining the formation of the Canadian Camp Club in 1905 ...

CAMP CLUB ORGANIZED.

Well-Known Sportsmen Anxious to Increase interest in Hunting.

An association to be known as the Canadian Camp Club was organized at a meeting of sportsmen, naturalists, and explorers held last night at the Metropolitan Club, Sixtleth Street and Fifth Avenue. Dr. G. Lenox Curtis was Chairman of the meeting and James A. Cruikshank Secretary. The club is the outcome of a social gathering of men who have camped in Canada, which was held in this city about five years ago, and which developed into a social organization, with nearly 500 members.

The charter of the Canadian Camp Club. it was said, had been approved by the Secretary of the Province of Canada, and the papers of incorporation would, be in the hands of the organization within ten days. No money will be spared to make the club a successful one, and everything will be done to increase the interest in hunting.

The club will be in one of the choicest game regions now open to sportsmen. A site has been selected adjacent to the Mississaga River. running generally northeast from Dayton, on Lake Huron, to Lake Winnebago, and thence to Hudson Bay, by way of Ground Hog River. It is the intention to buy choice locations all along this route of nearly 1,000 miles and built on them log camps and cabins.

The club owns several tracts of forest property, and on one of them, near Dayton, on Lake Wahquekobing, the club ton, on Lake Wanquekooing; the club headquarters will shortly be built. The organization plans to explore and map out much of this wild country and select and purchase. desirable sites for outlying camps. Caribou, wood buffalo, moose, and wild fowl are said to be found in great abundance along the Mississaga, as well as brook trout of enormous size, small-mouth black bass of record weight, and many other varieties. many other varieties.
