
Update on New Leepfrog Service

Water Rangers/ Lake Partner Program

BBLA Spring/ Summer 2024 Newsletter Big Basswood Lake now has two water testing locations on the lake with the Water Rangers program - one started last year and the other in May of this year. Test kits are provided by the Kensington Conservancy (Water Quality Monitoring - The Kensington Conservancy). The testing in the West Basin is conducted in Jamie Bay on the north-west shore accessed off McCallum Road, and the new location in the East Basin is in Minnie's Bay on the south-east shore.



The BBLA would like to thank the Kensington Conservancy for sponsoring the Water Rangers testing program and the two Big Basswood Lake properties who are conducting the sampling and testing. The results are posted on an easily accessible and easy to read site at Water Rangers. The testing program on Big Basswood Lake is new, so it will take a few years to develop and track trends in water quality over the coming years. We believe that improvement will be shown after the BBLA's Septic System inspection program conducted a couple of years ago, served to raise awareness

on the importance of a properly operating liquid waste disposal system

The Water Rangers testing program is in addition to our Lake's participation in the Lake Partners Program which has been in place for many years. Please take a minute to refer to the links and update yourself on this important new initiative.

Highway 17 and 129 Construction

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There are road construction projects planned for Highway 17 and Highway 129 in the Huron Shores area. These projects are expected to take a couple of years to complete and will consist of grading and resurfacing of Highway 17 between Iron Bridge and Nestorville, and Highway 129 North from Thessalon to Highway 554. This will include replacement of culverts and maintenance to ditches and road shoulders. The Municipality of Huron Shores has announced these upcoming road projects and indicated that there will be crews working on

various roads throughout the area, aiming to improve road quality and safety.

For the most current and detailed information, it would be best to stay tuned to the Municipality of Huron Shores official communications or contact them directly. They will provide updates on the construction activities, including any changes to traffic patterns and alternate routes during the construction period.

It's always a good idea to check these sources regularly for the latest information on road construction projects, especially if you're planning travel through the area. The Ontario 511Traveller Information website is also a useful resource for up-to-date status of road closures and delays you may encounter.

Here is the current Ontario 511 information that is in effect and updated as of June 28, 2024

Highway 17 – Anticipated project duration: May 20, 2024 to October 31, 2025

Expect delays up to 10 minutes.

Highway 17 from McFadden Line (Nestorville), easterly for 33.3 kilometres to Highway 546 Iron Bridge

Flagging for single lane closures for construction operations from Monday to Friday. Potential speed reduction from 90 kilometres per hour to 70 kilometres per hour in construction limits. Effective lane width is 3.75 metres. No construction changes to existing height restrictions or bridges.

Highway 129 – Anticipated project duration: June 5, 2023 to September 6, 2024

Update as of June 28, 2024.

Expect delays up to 10 minutes.

Structural Culvert Site #1, 2.25 kilometres south of the junction with Highway 556. Structural Culvert Site #2, 8.5 kilometres north of the junction with Highway 556. Total project length, 4.1 kilometres.

Single lane closure controlled by traffic lights. Reduced speed limit to 60 kilometres per

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Big Basswood Water Levels

BBLA Spring/ Summer 2024 Newsletter Page 8 As reported in last fall's newsletter, the BBLA hosted a public meeting with the MNRF in September/2023, regarding water levels on Big Basswood Lake. A number of individuals had expressed ongoing concerns with fluctuating water levels, particularly in late summer and early fall.



Unfortunately, that meeting was poorly attended, both in-person and via Zoom. Problems with the technology prevented an effective presentation via live stream

As reported in the last newsletter, the main takeaway from the meeting was that we have essentially been in a drought situation for quite some time. Additionally, the control of lake water levels is not an exact science and the MNRF endeavors to do the best they can to maintain an adequate water level on the lake.

Subsequent to the BBLA meeting, the MNRF has met twice with the Huron Shores municipal environmental services committee. In late fall, Shannon Hobbs gave the same presentation that he had prepared for the BBLA. The committee (of which Larry Allcorn is a member) then met and reviewed the material and consolidated questions that resulted from the two presentations. On Tuesday, Feb 3, 2024 the MNRF and Huron Shores held a lengthy workshop to review our questions and have further discussion.

Key takeaways from this meeting was the need for ongoing communication with the MNRF throughout the summer months as water levels change. We agreed that this communication would happen through both the municipal office for issues that might affect municipal infrastructure and also through a few observers that are situated close to Harris Creek and the dam.

As noted earlier, control of lake levels in an inexact science. As if to prove this, we had a very unusual spring freshet. With almost no snow melt, Basswood Lake water level was lower than normal in the spring. However, heavy rain since has forced the water levels up higher than usual for this time of the year. As of this writing, we believe that the dam is open the right amount to balance water levels in both Basswood and Bright lakes.

We continue to dialogue with the MNRF and will continue to monitor as the summer unfolds. In the meantime, if you have any concerns or questions, we encourage you to communicate them to Larry Allcorn (lallcorn@bell.net) who will follow them up with Huron Shores and the MNRF.

Lake Trout Lakes

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Over the years, we have heard that Big Basswood Lake was a designated "Lake Trout Lake". However, over that time, we did not have a lot of information on the meaning of this designation.

During the workshop that Huron Shores had with the MNRF (see previous article on MNRF Town Hall), we asked them to clarify this designation. Following is the information that Robyn Jones of the MNRF supllied us with in response...

Dear Larry Allcorn,

Thank you for your previous email.

Firstly, yes, Basswood Lake (Waterbody Identifier 17-3164-51328), has a naturally occurring population of lake trout and is designated as a lake trout lake. A published list of designated lake trout lakes can be found here. It is a pretty extensive list, however, it is recommended to reach out to the local Ministry office to confirm a designation.

Lake Trout lakes are relatively rare. Only about one percent of Ontario's lakes contain Lake Trout, but this makes up about 25% of lake trout lakes worldwide. From a fisheries management perspective, the Ministry designates and manages lakes with lake trout populations as either "naturally reproducing" or "put-growtake". Naturally reproducing lake trout lakes are either lakes with a naturally occurring population of Lake Trout or lakes with extirpated populations that have been identified as candidates for rehabilitation. Put-grow-take lake trout lakes are stocked lakes that are managed by the ministry to provide recreational fishing opportunities to re-direct angler efforts away from vulnerable self-sustaining populations.

MNRF has specific policies regarding designated Lake Trout lakes. This includes the principal that the Ministry will not dispose of vacant, undeveloped Crown land, where the disposition could result in impacts to habitat or lakeshore carry capacity for lake trout.

Additionally, the Lakeshore Capacity Assessment Handbook has been developed by the province to provide guidance to municipalities and other stakeholders responsible for the management of development along the shorelines of Ontario's inland lakes within the Precambrian Shield. This is intended as a tool to help municipalities meet their obligation under the Planning Act to be consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement. The province recommends that generally there will be no new municipal land use planning approvals for new or more intense residential, commercial, or industrial development within 300m of a lake trout lake identified as "at capacity" based on water quality modelling. More information on assessing lakeshore capacity can be found here.

iNaturalist

BBLA Spring/ Summer 2024 Newsletter Page 10 The 2021 summer AGM demonstrated a strong interest in being able to observe and track the nature we are so fortunately surrounded with at Big Basswood Lake. An initiative was developed with the assistance of Carter Dorscht, Executive Director of The Kensington Conservancy, to encourage usage of iNaturalist.com.

iNaturalist describes itself as ...an online social network of people sharing biodiversity information to help each other learn about nature.

Considered one of the most popular nature apps, iNaturalist helps you instantly identify flora and fauna that you have spotted in your travels. You can record your observations with a mobile phone or a dedicated camera.

My workflow is heavily centered on taking pictures with a camera and telephoto lenses. When I feel inclined, I log onto iNaturalist and upload the observations recorded on my camera, using a laptop. I find the web-based version of iNaturalist easier to work with, but occasionally I will use the app on my phone to upload an observation immediately. Although using the phone app seems less versatile to me, it can provide immediate suggestions as to the identity of a plant, animal, bird, or insect that I come across and am interested in learning about.

iNaturalist is packed full of features and one of them is a tool that they have named "Projects". The Kensington Conservancy assisted us in setting up our own Project, called "Big Basswood Lake Watershed Project".

Our iNaturalist Project is essentially a geo-fence surrounding the Big Basswood Lake Watershed. Anyone who submits an observation on iNaturalist within this geographical area, is automatically flagged in the Big Basswood Lake Watershed Project.


Help and About iNaturalist

BBLA Spring/ Summer 2024 Newsletter Page 12 The Board of the BBLA has continued to monitor activities within the Municipality of Huron Shores and the council throughout the winter on a number of major issues that relate to the preservation of the quality of the Big Basswood Lake experience on behalf of cottage owners.

In addition, as announced in the fall newsletter, Larry Allcorn now sits as a full time member of the Envivonmental Services Committee of Huron Shores council. In this role he participates in discussions that affects all environmental concerns around all areas in our municipality.

Some of the topics currently being discussed by this committee include:

- a presentation to the committee on the approach and outcome of the septic inspection program undertaken by the BBLA
- ongoing dialogue with the MECP (Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks – formerly the MOE) on status of ECAs (Environmental Compliance Authorization) for all trailer parks in the area
- impact of trailer park zoning in the new official plan
- new trailer licensing bylaw
- interaction with the MNRF on water level/dam operating plans in the municipality (see separate article)
- boat wash stations

As with any governmental authority, federal, provincial, or municipal, progress on discussions must move through a protracted process including the seeking of legal advice and consultation with the appropriate provincial authorities to ensure that any action taken passes the thresholds required.

We will continue to monitor and advocate on issues that are of concern to the community of Huron Shores and Big Basswood lake residents specifically.

Ward 2 Transfer Station Pilot Project

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Effective May 1st, 2024, Ward 2 Landfill Site (473 Cullis Road) transitioned from a traditional landfill to a transfer station as part of a 3-month Pilot Program.

During the pilot program, the Ward 2 landfill site is only accepting bagged household garbage and recycling. This means that other types of waste, such as construction debris and yard waste, will not be accepted at this location during the pilot period. The Municipality encourages all ratepayers to utilize the other waste sites for disposal of materials not accepted at the Ward 2 Landfill Site during this pilot program:

- Ward 1 200 Highway 129
- Ward 3 41 Red Rock Road
- Ward 4 1035 Dean Lake Road

Throughout the duration of the pilot program, the Municipality welcomes your feedback and suggestions regarding the operational changes by emailing email@huronshores.ca.

Your input will help the Municipality assess the impact of these changes on our community and make informed decisions on future waste management strategies in our Municipality.



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A reminder to all of our members that a membership in the Big Basswood Lake Association includes a membership in the Federation of Ontario Cottagers Association.

FOCA is currently some 500+ members strong representing over 50,000 waterfront land owners in the province.

They provide us with a number of valuable services:

- Ongoing participation in their lake partner program. We submit our lake test results for clarity and phosphorous levels to the lake partner data base every year. This data base continues to show Basswood as one of the clearest lakes in Ontario
- FOCA holds a spring and a fall meeting every year, both of which usually feature valuable information. The spring event was held virtually and in person in Toronto on Saturday, March 2cd. All of our members are welcome to attend these interesting meetings as you are all member of FOCA.
